
- Students will take a level test and will be divided into level A, B and C according to the students' level of writing. (Level test can only be taken once during the undergraduate course)

- \*\* From the 2014 spring semester, students whose writing test is Level C are required to take the Basic Writing course (Elective, one credit) before taking an elective writing course.
- \* Writing classes: Logical Writing, Critical Writing, Practical Writing, Creative Writing
- ③ Physical Education: 4AU should be completed. (not counted for GPA but required for graduation.)
  - · Since each course in Physical Education has 2AU, 2 courses should be taken
  - · 2AU among 4AU can be replaced by extra curricular sports activities.
- ④ Community Service: Not applicable to students entering KAIST in 2011 and thereafter. However, leadership mileage will be awarded for proof of community service.
  - · Students who entered the KAIST in or before 2006 must complete 4AU; those who enter the KAIST between 2007 and 2010 must complete 2AU. (not counted for GPA but required for graduation.)
  - · Service at the flower town, serving as an executive member of student association, serving as a student representative of a department, service in the school clean-up campaign, service at a public welfare organization such as the welfare center, service at public organizations such as the national park management corporation, service at government offices such as a city hall and a town-block office.
  - The proof of the community service sealed with the signature of the service organization for the off-campus service and of the head of the corresponding administrative office for the on-campus service should be submitted to the Academic Registrar's Team.
- ⑤ Humanity/Leadership: 2AU(not counted for GPA but required for graduation.)
  - · Applicable to students who enter the KAIST in or after 2007 and is mandatory for graduation
  - · Program and credit recognition per course
    - \* Only students within their first 2 semesters can attend the Humanity/Leadership III course

- ⑥ Ethics and Satey II: 1AU(applicable to all of the students presently studying at KAIST. not counted for GPA but required for graduation.)
  - Ethics and Safety II(HSS070/10.179) includes Research Ethics, Lab Safety, Human Rights & Sexual Morality and Leadership. Students do not have to register for the course but go to the web-site(http://eethics.kaist.ac.kr), complete the course and pass the test with the grade "S" if they satisfy the criteria below.
  - Opening semester : Spring, Fall
  - Taking the course: From the 2015 freshmen, Ethics and Safety II is a basic course offered during the first semester. Please log in at <a href="http://eethics.kaist.ac.kr">http://eethics.kaist.ac.kr</a> for course registration. However, in the case of the 2014 freshmen, please log in at <a href="http://eethics.kaist.ac.kr">http://eethics.kaist.ac.kr</a> for registration.
  - Students must score 80 or higher in all of the 4 subjects (Research Ethics, Lab Safety, Sexual Violence & Sexual Harassment, and Leadership) However, in the cases of Human Right and Sexual Ethics, students will be evaluated on whether they completed the course or not.
  - \*Note that total points are 100 in each subject.
  - Exam period: From the beginning of each semester through the final exam period (One may take exams by up to ten times per each sub-course during the period)
  - Exam-taking process



- \* Students will pass the course only with a score of 80 or higher in all of the 4 subjects during one semester.
- Thappy College Life/Exciting College Life: 2AU for students entering KAIST in 2011 and thereafter (not counted for GPA but required for graduation.)
  - Students must complete Happy College Life (1AU) in the first semester of their freshmen year and Exciting College Life(1AU) in the following semester.
- o Elective General Courses in Humanities & Social Sciences: at least 21 credits
  - Take (6 credits) 1 course of each of the following 2 categories among 3 categories: Humanity, Society and Literature and Arts; the rest can be chosen regardless of the category. (applicable to students entering KAIST in 2009 and thereafter; for those who have entered KAIST in and before 2008, refer to the Course Completion Requirements by Year of Admission)
  - Students entering KAIST between 2007 and 2010 should earn at least 9 credits through lectures in English among the 21 credits required as Elective General Courses in Humanities & Social Science.
  - Students having a double major take 12 credits without considering categories. (Students entering KAIST between 2007 and 2010 should take 6 credits through lectures in English.)
    - \* The requirement of taking lectures in English as Elective General Courses in Humanities & Social Science is not applied to students entering KAIST in 2011 or thereafter.

- o General course requirements for international students in the undergraduate program
- English language courses
  - Students whose mother tongue is English or students who graduated a high school in which English is the primary language will be exempted from English language requisites and will be graded with an 'S'. (Applicable from 2013 cohorts)
  - Students who completed the entire high school course speaking English as primary language will be exempted from English language requisite and will be graded with an "S" (Applicable from 1998 cohorts).
- Completion of Korean language courses(Exemption from Writing course): International students are exempt from Writing course, which is a liberal education requisite. However, the students who are exempt from Writing course should take HSS006(10.108, Basic Korean I for foreign Students, 3 credits), which is a liberal education requisite, and HSS193(10.167, Basic Korean II for foreign Students, 3 credits), which is a general elective course. (applicable to students who enter the KAIST in or after 1998)
- Completion of AU courses: International students must complete AU courses (Total 9: Physical Education 2AU, Humanity/Leadership 2AU, Ethics and Safety II 1AU, Happy College Life 1AU, Exciting College Life 1AU which are liberal education requisites. However, Humanity/Leadership may be substituted by Cultural Experience (applicable to students who enter the KAIST in or after 2011).
  - \* Students entering KAIST in 2007 to 2010: Physical Education 4AU, Community Service 2AU, Humanity/Leadership 2AU, Ethics and Safety II 1AU (Total: 9AU)
  - \* Students entering KAIST in 2006 or before: Physical Education 4AU, Community Service 4AU, Ethics and Safety II 1AU (Total: 9AU)

  - Basic Mechanical Practice(3), Mechanical Engineering Laboratory(3), Capstone Design I(3), Engineering Design(3)
  - o Elective Major Courses: at least 47 credits.
    - Select at least 7 courses out of 9 courses:
      - Thermodynamics(3), Fluid Mechanics(3), Mechanics of Materials(3), Dynamics(3), Applied Electronics(3), Modeling and Control of Engineering Systems(3), Understanding of Materials and Processing(3), Heat Transfer(3), Mechanical Vibrations(3)
  - \* Major course credits from other majors are only approved up to 10 credits.
- E. Completion of Eletive Courses: Take mandatory or elective major courses from other majors.
- F. Completion of Research Courses: at least 3 credits
  - Taking at least 3 credits of Research Courses is mandatory, but the students can take Capstone Design II (3) instead.
  - \* Students having a double major are exempt.
  - \* Individual Study credits are approved as Research Courses credits up to 4 credits, and Seminar credits are approved as Elective Course credits.
- G. English Language Requirement
  - Before entering or during studying at KAIST, students should obtain the minimum required score
    or higher from one of the following: TOEFL, TOEIC, TEPS and IELTS.
  - $\circ$  Students who have hearing impairment level 3 or above should obtain the minimum required score or higher, excluding listening.
  - 1) Students who have submitted past scores for TOEIC (before April 2006) or TEPS (before February 28, 2007)

#### □ Interim Measures

### 1) Undergraduate Program

- o The above requirements for Undergraduate Program students in Division of Mechanical Engineering are applicable to students entering KAIST in 2004 and thereafter. Students entering KAIST in 2003 and before can choose either the current Course Completion Requirements or the Course Completion Requirements of admission year at their desire.
- $\circ$  If students entering KAIST in 2003 and before choose he Course Completion Requirements of admission year, interim measures are prescribed as follows:
  - In case in which students are not able to satisfy the requirements of Mandatory Major courses because the courses are revised or substituted, the students should earn more Elective credits by the same amount that is deficient in Mandatory Major course.
  - In case in which students have taken any Major Mandatory courses that have been changed into Elective courses (Thermodynamics(3), Fluid Mechanics(3), Dynamics(3), Applied Electronics(3), Mechanical Engineering Laboratory II(3), Engineering Design(3), and Understanding of Materials and Processing(3)), the credits are approved as Major Mandatory course credits.
  - Students who have not taken any course out of Mechanical Engineering Laboratory I(3) and Mechanical Engineering Laboratory II(3), they should take Mechanical Engineering Laboratory (3). Moreover, if students have not taken both Mechanical Engineering Laboratory I(3) and Mechanical Engineering Laboratory II(3), they should take both Mechanical Engineering Laboratory (3) and New Design and Experience in Mechanical Systems (3). In such a case, New Design and Experience in Mechanical Systems (3) is not approved as an Elective Basic Course.
- o If students entering KAIST in 2003 and before choose he Course Completion Requirements of admission year, interim measures are prescribed as follows:
  - Introductory Lab. Design and Drafting can substitute for Basic Mechanical Practice, and in such a case, the required credits for Mandatory Major course and Elective Major are 8 credits and 41 credits, respectively.
  - If students have already taken both Mechanical Engineering Laboratory I(3) and Mechanical Engineering Laboratory II(3), Mechanical Engineering Laboratory(3) (Mandatory Major) and Mechanical Engineering Laboratory II(3) (Elective Major) are approved substitutingly.

## 2) Integrated Master's and Doctoral Degree Program

- The above requirements for Integrated Master's and Doctoral Degree Program students in Division of Mechanical Engineering are applicable to students entering KAIST in 2005 and thereafter. Students entering KAIST in 2004 and before can choose either the current Course Completion Requirements or the Course Completion Requirements of admission year at their desire.
- \*\* Substitutive courses for the abolished courses are determined by the department, and they are to be announced on the website (me.kaist.ac.kr).
